# A DIVISION ON A GROUND

for five harps

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**Gottfreid Finger** (1660-1730) was a Moravian viol player and composer. He served as a musician in a Catholic chapel in London beginning in 1687 and remained in London working as a performer and composer. After he was only awarded only 4<sup>th</sup> prize in a 1701 competition, he left for North Germany, where he later worked for the Innsbruck Court. Most of his compositions are works for the theatre, as well as instrumental sonatas.

**Ground** - a short melody that is repeated many times in succession, usually in the bass (hence, the common term *ground bass*). Continuous variation that fits the pattern (the division) occurs in a higher register. This composition originally came from Finger's *The Division Flute* (1706).

**Division** – a type of variation in which each note of a melodic line is divided into shorter, fastermoving notes. These "dividers," punctuating the melodic line, are notes in rhythmic repetition comprised of simple ornamentation such as a trill, *cambiata*, or turn.



#### **Performance Notes**

This work can be performed several ways, on either lever harps or pedal harps.

# 2 Harps: Harp 1 and Harp 4

In its simplest form, a musician or a pairing of a bass instrument and an embellishing choral instrument would perform the ground, while a solo instrument would perform the ten variations above it.

# 3 Harps: Harp 1, Harp 4, and Harp 5

In another simple rendition, a second instrument is added to fill out the *ground's* suggested harmonies.

# 3 Harps (alternate): Harp 1, Harp 2, and Harp 5

In a more complex version, the division can be performed in canon to create counterpoint. Because the *division* is written to fit the 8-measure-long ground, it's possible to layer any eight-measure variation on another.

### 4 Harps: Harp 1, Harp 2, Harp 4, and Harp 5

The *division's* variations are layered in counterpoint, and the *ground's* harmonies are embellished.

## 5 Harps: Harp 1, Harp 2, Harp 3, Harp 4, and Harp 5

In the most complex version, 3 layers of counterpoint in the *division* are played against 2 layers of the *ground*.
